Thompson urges residents to see value in recycling

Environmental Affairs Deputy Minister Barbara Thompson visited Eastwood on Saturday to officially hand over trade tools and a bakkie for mobile recycling within the city.

Addressing the community of Ward 34 in Eastwood, Thompson expressed concern over the deteriorating state of cleanliness within the city and residential communities.

“As a person born and bred in Pietermaritzburg, I will look at allocating department resources to ensure this city is always beautiful and clean,” said Thompson.

Thompson further highlighted the importance of recycling and employment opportunities that arise from waste management and recycling.

“We need to start understanding that waste is a commodity, and it is time the community plays their part. When we realise the importance of recycling and the benefits, development can start occurring in our communities”, said Thompson.

Handing over the new

bakkie to Songmivelo, a mobile environmental and awareness group that employs vagrants and unemployed youth to collect recyclable material for recycling within the city, Thomson said this was the start of many such initiatives.

Songimvelo co-founders Hugo Ngcobo and Irvin Khumalo said the sole mandate of the mobile recycling initiative was to eradicate illegal dumping and create more awareness about environmental issues among the youth.

“This is part of radical transformation. Cans and plastic bottles can make a huge difference, but this transformation can only work with the community’s help”, said District Mayor Thobekile Maphumalo.

Msunduzi Mayor Themba Njilo mirrored Maphumalo’s words stating that the clean-up initiative and tools donated by the department of environmental affairs would help transform the city.

“This is a dream come true for the city to take on a clean-up initiative. We’ve already started

the cleaning process beginning at the Ematsheni area and clearing up the streets,” said Njilo.

Thompson noted that the city had other environmental issues;

such as educating residents about environmental issues and air pollution from the industrial sector that still needs to be attended to.

The hand over is just a “drop in the ocean”, to the environmental development that needs to occur in the city.

New plans for Polo Crosse fields

City to continue hosting events

The Polo Crosse site will not be sold. Instead the municipality will seek investors who are willing to partner with the municipality in what will be a mutually beneficial arrangement for future development of the KwaZulu-Natal capital city.

This was revealed by Sustainable Development and City Entities General Manager Dr Ray Ngcobo who said the decision came after strategic discussions on increasing property value in the best interest of the city.

“Our position is that Polo Crosse is a very strategic piece of land and retaining it would be beneficial for the municipality, but equally rewarding for any investor willing to partner with us,” said Dr Ngcobo.

The land, is located in what is probably the fastest growing commercial sector of the city

and one of the last remaining large pieces of valuable land owned by the municipality in Pietermaritzburg.

Polo Crosse has strategic value to the city, especially with the Liberty Mall expansion, provincial government office precinct nearby, and the development of the Dorpspruit social housing project.

Dr. Ngcobo told Msunduzi News that with the anticipated development the municipality was forging ahead with the rollout of required infrastructure including bulk services, such as water and electricity to accommodate the anticipated demand.

“We have already received plans for the development of the government precinct.

We are following the given protocol to ensure that everything is above board,” said Ngcobo who pointed out that the government office precinct would see an

investment of R500 million.

He said the City decided on the public-private-partnership route because the land was one of the last pieces of “strategic land”, that the City owned.

“When development is considered, it is always important to think long term so it is our view that retaining ownership of strategic sites is in our best interest because we do not want to be in a position, say 50 to 100 years from now, where the municipality does not own any land. That would spell trouble” said Ngcobo.

Part of the plan for the site involves the municipality retaining control of the land, with a long lease, and bulk service agreements, providing some elements of the equity for the city to be a partner in the development of the land.

The polocrosse fields, the government office precinct and

the Liberty Mall expansion would all comprise one development node in the city.

The city was at present sorting out the supply chain procedures and negotiations with other government departments in order to embark on the public-private participation development plan, he said.

“We want to fast-track the polo fields,” said Ngcobo, adding that the City would only enter into a development with a property development company that had a solid background in commercial property development and preferably be listed in the Johannesburg Stock Exchange.

The move to embark on a public private partnership, Ngcobo concluded, was based on a thorough study and analysis of trends and best practices where such an arrangement is a standard practice by many major cities both in South Africa and worldwide.

A full council sitting has approved the staging of several events in the city believing that this will assist in raising the city’s profile. Acting Municipal Manager Sizwe Hadebe said hosting events on an annual basis was in line with best practices both in South Africa and worldwide where cities that played host to events obtained great publicity. Hadebe told councillors that this also helps in marketing the city to potential investors and tourists, ensuring prospects for future revenue generation. Aside from events such as Art in the Park, the Royal Show, the Duzi canoe race, City Marathon and the world renowned Comrades Marathon, the city also hosts a number of events that have, over the years, seen hundreds and thousands of people visiting Pietermaritzburg for business and other purposes.

Mayor assures sufficient power for winter

Msunduzi Mayor Themba Njilo has assured city residents that there is sufficient power on the grid to ensure that there is no disruption to the supply. He said this following an almost 48 hour outage that plunged nearly half the city in darkness during the Easter weekend, saying the crisis was "beyond control". Apart from visiting the site of the damaged cable overseeing the repair to the damaged cable, Mayor Njilo called a meeting with senior officials to discuss measures needed to avoid further long-duration blackouts particularly with winter fast approaching.

"Since the outage I have had meetings with the general manager for Infrastructure Services Sabatha Nomnganga to determine what should be done to avoid this happening again. I know there is a level of anxiety from the city residents as we approach winter, however the discussion I had with the general manager has left me with a sense of assurance that the grid will not be under pressure," said Njilo.

A total of R115 million has

been set aside to deal with infrastructure with primary focus on electricity. The power outage was caused by a fire on one of the main cables running from the Chatterton substation to Pine Street. The fire caused an oil leak on the high voltage cable. Unlike cable fractures on smaller supply lines, this line is pressurised with oil from the substation and required specialised technology

and skills prompting to city to call in engineers from out of town.

For the residents affected though, the mayor's apology and undertaking from officials that the grid will hold up during winter, is of little consolation. Although some residents are considering claiming for losses associated to spoilt food in fridges and freezers from the city's insurers, many are not going to bother.

Church leaders tackle social ills

Christians from different churches around Pietermaritzburg participated in a procession as part of the Good Friday celebrations. The procession began from St. Mary's Church in Jabu Ndlovu

Street, proceeded to Peter Kerchoff Street and concluded at the Cathedral of the Holy Nativity Church. Speaking during the service, pastor Stephen Hully urged church leaders to take a lead in a fight against social ills, citing

homelessness and drug abuse as one of the main problems that needed to be tackled. He warned that if the church turned a blind eye to society's problems it would lose its relevance to communities.

• **Msunduzi Municipality Chief Whip Truman Magubane has welcomed the new Ward 32 councillor Shaun Adkins wishing him well on his new position.** This was during the council sitting on April 24 where the chief whip applauded the new councillor for observing the council dress code on his maiden council sitting. Speaker Jabu Ngubo officially introduced Shaun Adkins (who was declared the winner by the Independent Electoral Commission following the by-election) to all councillors during the sitting and also wished him well on his term in public office.

• **Msunduzi officials should continue undergoing workshops in order to familiarise themselves with the new accounting system that has been introduced by Treasury.** This was the emphatic message from members of the Msunduzi Municipality Executive Committee (EXCO) at a recent meeting where it emerged that the new accounting system was being rolled out in the municipality. According to Exco members all officials concerned should understand the system so that the municipality complies with the prescripts from treasury ensuring that there is efficiency and transparency in the use of public funds.

• **The city will continue prioritizing debt collection in the next financial year in a bid to recoup over R1,8 billion owed to it by households, business and government departments.** This was the undertaking made by Chief Financial Officer (CFO) Nelly Ngcobo at a recent EXCO meeting. Senior councillors, at the meeting, learnt that some debts have been outstanding for over a year. Ngcobo also told the committee that the municipality would prioritise the capping of electricity and water losses by ensuring the rollout and accurate reading of metres.

Young entrepreneurs making a difference

Two local youngsters driven by a desire to make a difference in nature conservation are proving that entrepreneurship can be applied anywhere.

Irvin Khumalo and Hugo Ngcobo say they are setting the bar for young entrepreneurs in Msunduzi in the waste management sector, with the founding of recycling company Songimvelo.

The young entrepreneurs met in 2012, noticing that they have similar interests within the entrepreneurial field and decided to venture into business together.

"It had been a dream, knocking on doors at the various departments trying to get funding and finally things are starting to come together", the pair said.

"Songimvelo" meaning to preserve nature defines Khumalo's and Ngcobo's objective with the waste management company, which is to bring awareness, educate and create a lucrative business for economic development within the city.

Through the help of the Msunduzi Municipality the young entrepreneurs managed to submit a proposal which reached the national office of Environmental affairs and are currently working closely with Deputy Director

General Mark Gordon and Deputy Minister Barbara Thomson.

"They were able to accommodate our vision, so much so that a vehicle for mobile recycling has been officially donated to the Songimvelo initiative", said Ngcobo.

The vehicle journeys around the streets of the city, townships and schools gathering waste and recyclable material such as cardboard, plastics, paper and cans.

Through venturing into mobile recycling the Songimvelo team grows each day, as an opportunity to gain profit and help clean the environment is afforded "by working with us".

Khumalo and Ngcobo say that through following their dreams, they're able to indirectly create employment for the unemployed person in Pietermaritzburg.

"We currently permanently employ three people, work with volunteers and the poor homeless people living in the Pietermaritzburg streets, and we plan to grow employing more people and be based in central city".

Expansion is already in the plans for the team as they see the waste management industry an area that has not been fully exploited with opportunities

existing in various sectors, "A lot can still be done in waste management, it's not only recycling, there's manufacturing reusing the recycled material, expo's and animation series to teach young people of the greater good that comes with knowing how to handle recyclable

material".

The pair admitted that the response to their company's initiative has been overwhelmingly positive as Pietermaritzburg has a niche as the city has an influx of recyclable materials that are unattended to.

Their work is reputedly noticed

as the Songimvelo group are ambassadors of the National Recycling Forum and Brand SA play your part, which they say is a huge honour but there is no greater honour than cleaning up the city and creating opportunities.

Technology to help with billing

The Msunduzi Municipality will make use of modern technology in a bid to ensure that customers get their monthly bills without any problems.

This follows an agreement reached at a recent executive committee (Exco) meeting. In a report tabled before senior councillors it was indicated that there were challenges when it

comes to ensuring that customers receive their bills.

Chief Financial Officer Nelly Ngcobo said the municipality would continue employing a range of initiatives to ensure that customers paid their bills.

Part of this, the CFO told members, was to fast track the installation of prepaid metres in households across the municipality. Exco member

Eunice Zondi said there should be more ways employed to communicate with customers.

"We should look at using SMSes so that we can reach all customers. This should also be used to tell customers if there is going to be interruption of services," said Zondi. Exco members agreed that this move would help in improving communication with residents.

More capacity for city power

Msunduzi Municipality has purchased two new transformers for R16 million as part of the plans to improve power supply in the city.

This was revealed by Infrastructure Services General Manager Sabatha Nomnganga at

a full council sitting on April 24.

The two transformers were bought in Vietnam and will help the city meet its power demands in future.

As part of the arrangement with the purchase of the transformers, Nomnganga

joined by Infrastructure Services Committee Chairperson Thobani Zuma, will visit Vietnam in order to get a thorough understanding of how the transformers work.

Council noted that the trip scheduled for May this year would be beneficial to the city.

KNOW YOUR CITY

Georgetown – Pietermaritzburg

The Edendale and Imbali Heritage, Freedom Route and Westgate Tourism Experience incorporating Georgetown, is a powerful narrative of contribution to the area.

Georgetown Mission in Edendale dates back to the 1850's and was originally the land grant farm 'Welverdiend' that Voortrekker leader Andries Pretorius received as a reward for his part in the Battle of Blood River (Ncome). About six thousand acres of this land were purchased by the missionary James Allison in 1851 to settle Swazi and Hlubi Christian Converts he brought with him to the area.

The mission was named Georgetown after Sir George Grey, the Governor of the Cape Colony, who supported the initiative. The Black settlers became shareholders in the land, making the area unique.

These converts or 'oNonhlevu' as they were later known, lived a Western life and were always prepared to help others to read and write.

They also became seasoned farmers and Georgetown became an economically, self sustainable hub of fresh produce and a major supplier to the city market.

This, however, did not go down well with the Colonial powers then. The Georgetown people wanted borough recognition but this was refused in 1882 and again as late as 1930.

The place also became an important cog during the Anglo-Zulu war of 1879.

The residents contributed a contingent of 100 mounted men. They first served under Colonel Durnford at Isandlwana and later under Captain Shepstone, son of Theophilus.

Their commanding officer was Simeon Khambule who was later awarded the 'Distinguished



Service Medal which, in the opinion of many, should have been the Victoria Cross. Near the church there is a monument to the men who fell in the Anglo-Zulu, not Anglo – Zulu War.

The first Wesleyan church in Scotts Street, built in the early 50s from unbaked bricks still stands strong today and is a symbol of a people who not only sought to be independent economically but were politically conscious hence their huge contribution to the countries national liberation agenda

"The story of the Edendale community is that of people striving for a place as profit making farmers and entrepreneurs in the colonial economy, but whose competitiveness was increasingly seen as a threat to the success of the white colonial

gentry.

For the colonists, the destiny of all Africans was that of a labouring class.

As far as the colonists were concerned, the Edendale Christians, with their education and skills, were to be the vanguard of a disciplined labour force.

The history of Edendale shows how the community resisted this definition of its role, and constructed their own cultural world within colonial society."
