
Msunduzi Municipal Library Services



Msunduzi Municipal Library (formerly The Natal Society Library) has provided public library services for the people of Pieten aritzburg since 1850. On 1 April 2004, libraries and staff of The Natal Society were integrated into the Msunduzi Municipality as Msunduzi Municipal Library Services. The main library, named the Bessie Head Library, and eight branch libraries, aim to provide a comprehensive library service to all residents of the Msunduzi Municipal area.

THE BESSIE HEAD LIBRARY

The Natal Society Library, th public library in Pietermaritzburg, was administered by th Natal Society for over 157 years from 1850 until 2004. On 1 April 2004 th Natal Society Library and its staff were integrated into th Msunduzi Municipality and became th Msunduzi Municipal Library Services. In June 2005, during a major project where main steet s and major public buildings in Pietermaritzburg were renamed, th Main Library building became th Bessie Head Library.

Bessie Head 6 July 1937 ~ 26 April 1986



Bessie Amelia Emery was born on the 6th of July 1937 in Pietermaritzburg. She was born in a mental hospital, the daughter of a white woman named Bessie Amelia Birch and an unnamed black father. She was brought up in foster care and then in a mission orphanage.

She obtained teaching qualifications in January 1957 and from 1956 to 1958 she taught at Clairwood Coloured School in Durban.

From 1958 to 1960 Bessie got involved in the world of journalism, working as a journalist for eth. Golden City Post and Drum magazine. At the beginning of 1960, she joined the Pan Africanist Congress, a political movement. On the first of September 1961 she married Harold. Head and in March 1964 Bessie Head left South Africa on an exit permit to Botswana, where she lived and worked as a lecturer and writer until her death on April 26, 1986.

LIBRARY SERVICES

BESSIE HEAD LIBRARY

This central library has a wide range and choice of resources including books, large-print books, newspapers and periodicals, audio-books on CD and cassette, DVDs, videos, music CDs and scores, and CD ROMs for all age groups from infancy to old age.

The Adults and Children's Lending Libraries and the Music/Audio-Visual Library provide eth se resources for loan for recreation, to provide general information and to support cultural and personal development. Teachers, parents and students may book for groups of learners to view a Variety of set works and educational videos/DVDs at the Library.

The Travelling Library takes books, including large-print, to a variety of venues in the suburbanareas.

The Housebound Service delivers books (including large-print) and audio-books to the infirm and eth aged in their own homes and residences for the aged.

The Adults Reference Library has been in existence for 157 years. It was founded by a group of prominent residents who hoped to promote the Colony by coll cting and disseminating accurate information. In s library has an extensive coll ction of reference materials and information resources with which it is able to support research, business, government and vocational endeavours and the needs of tertiary level students.

The Legal Deposit Collection was established in 1916, when this library was one of the 5 libraries in South Africa accorded Legal Deposit status. This privilege has helped make it into one of South Africa's major research and information libraries. Legal Deposit libraries play a unique and very important role as custodians, in perpetuity, of this country's cultural wealth and information.

Th ough the Adult Reference Library all the citizens of South Africa have access to this huge cold ction of South African books, pamphlets, government publications, periodicals and newspapers.

The Periodicals Department offers, in addition to periodicals belonging to the Legal Deposit' Coll ction, access to a small range of publications purchased on subscription and provides a public reading area.

The Children's Reference Library has an extensive cold ction of material to support the educational rneeds of primary and secondary school learners.

BRANCH LIBRARIES

The re are eight branch libraries in the Msunduzi Municipal Library Services. The re are three large-ones in Northdale, Georgetown and Eastwood, a small reone in Ashburton and three small ones in Woodlands, Sobantu and Ashdown. MACS Library, in the MACS Center in Alexandra Road, is established in an old blue travelling library bus.

The eight branch libraries, while offering a small r range of materials than is available at the mainlibrary, endeavour to meet the needs of the communities they serve by offering Adults and Children's Lending services, and Children's Reference services in support of education. A limited Adult Referenceservice is available at Northdale, Georgetown and Eastwood libraries. Georgetown provides a study areaand a Travell ng Library service to schools.

AMERICAN CORNER

The American Corner is a miniature public library on the First Floor of the Main Msunduzi Municipal Library which was established in partnership with the United States Embassy.

The cold ction consists of fiction, non-fiction and reference books, periodicals, DVDs and CD ROMs on America and/or by American authors. Computers are available for online research on and about America. Programmes of talks, workshops and video showings are run, many of them with speakers brought out from the United States for this purpose. The Education Officer, from the Consulate in Durban, visits regularly to meet with anyone wishing to study in the United States.

FACILITIES FOR HIRE

HOLIDAY PROGRAMMES

The central Children's Lending Library and most of the branch libraries conduct holiday programmes for children during the July and December school holidays.
